THE CARILLON

SOMEONE once described faithfulness to me as walking through the doors that God opens for you (and not turning back to get into the ones already closed). We don't always get to choose what doors open to us in life and as a church, but we do get to decide whether we will walk through the open door or if we cling to the closed door. At the beginning of 2022, I invited IPC to be an open church—open to God, open to neighbor, open to God's future. And as the program year comes to a close, it's worthwhile to recount our faithful instances walking through open doors.

Together with St. Barnabas, we co-sponsored the Khopolwak family from Afghanistan and have diligently been at work helping them settle into their new home in a new community in a new country. Countless volunteers have spent countless hours walking through open doors.

Together with St. Barnabas, we merged our youth ministries in a new venture, imagining a different model of faith formation and a new configuration of Christian community. Each Sunday evening, a group of young adults walk into God's future.

During Lent and Holy Week, we worshipped ecumenically with Aldersgate United Methodist Church and St. Barnabas, in very distinct services, representing the diversity and breadth of the Christian tradition and the beauty found within it.

At the May Session meeting, I shared a meditation on Acts 16:6-10. In the story, Paul, Silas, and Timothy are off on a journey to share what has happened in and through Jesus Christ. And we are told that they were "forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word in Asia." Then, in the next verse, when they attempted to enter Bithynia, "the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them." Two closed doors. But they kept knocking and kept trying and eventually cross over to Macedonia "being convinced that God called us...." A door opened for them. Paul, Silas, and Timothy faithfully walked through it.

As we enter the summer months, may we continue to have the courage and faith to walk through open doors; and may we have such trust and hope in God that when we do encounter a closed door, we persevere knowing that the God who began a good work in us will bring it to completion.

Seeds

BEING A DISCIPLE OF JESUS CHRIST IS A LONG HAUL. It is joy-filled and frustrating, miraculous and at times disillusioning. We make a conscious decision to follow Christ (over and over again); we try to hew as closely to his path as we are able (at times failing miserably); we try to be persistent and intentional in our seeking. Through times of both spiritual growth and desert wandering, we are carried by the faith, prayers, and worship of our brothers and sisters in this church and beyond. We persevere because the prize – the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus (Philippians 3:14) – is precious beyond measure.

Which is why I can't help but wonder about all the people who have drifted away from church in these difficult days. Why do they leave? The Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:18-23) suggests that some, like seeds on unsuitable ground, fall away due to lack of engagement with the Word of God; for want of roots or a relationship with our Lord; or because of the rush of other possibilities competing for our time and hearts. Perhaps there are others who have simply become disillusioned with some aspect of the church or church life.

How can we cultivate a deeper involvement in and commitment to the life of faith and the life of the church? How do we better prepare ourselves to bear fruit? I would suggest (not without bias) that one way is being part of adult education – a continuous delving into matters of faith, and how we live out our faith – that can strengthen our grounding in this community. "Learn from me," Jesus says in Matthew 11:29. Other versions say "Learn of me," or "Learn with me". Whatever the translation, as disciples we are called to be life-long learners, growing in our understanding and deepening our love for God and one another.

The 2022 Annual Rivertowns Hunger Walk Hits a Home Run

Thanks to the tireless organizing efforts of the dynamic duo of Deacons Melissa Brown and Rachel Glynn, the May 15, 2022 version of the CROP Walk set an IPC record for participation and donations. Thirty six people of all ages and assorted canines made all or part of the trek from the church to Lyndhurst along the Aqueduct.

Donated IPC pizza, Bagel Emporium Bagels, and fruit fueled the walkers. A raffle spiced up the proceedings with our own Dr. Reuben Garcia winning a gift certificate to MP Taverna.

To date, \$6,248 was raised. Twenty-five percent comes back to the church and will go to Feeding Westchester. The remaining seventy-five percent will go to Church World Services earmarked for humanitarian aid in the Ukraine refugee crisis.

IN OTHER NEWS, the deacons continue to help our Afghan refugee family with a \$500 grant from The Agape Fund that will purchase a stroller/accessories to be used from infancy thru preschool.

Also, \$500 each was sent to Irvington, Dobbs Ferry, Hastings and Tarrytown for camp scholarships for needy children.

The Deacons work sending cards for the sick and providing rides for medical appointments continues.

Music Notes

Dear IPC Family:



IN THE FINAL CARILLON of the 2021-22 program year, I first offer a note of gratitude, then a reflection on another formative figure in my faith journey, and finally a preview of the theme of my articles for the 2022-23 program year.

Profound gratitude to each and every singer in Chancel Choir! This program year was filled with the highest ups and lowest downs. From Section Leaders only to Chancel Choir only to congregational singing, from masks required to optional, from vaccines optional to required... in the face of all of that, I asked for the highest degree of flexibility, patience, and generosity of the Chancel Choir. They always did so with grace. In the face of impossible odds, they managed to completely fulfill their role as defined in the Book of Order "to lead and support the congregation in the singing of prayer," week after week after week. I know I speak for the entire congregation when I say that I thank God for them.

It is a gift from God to lead a music ministry – to lead (along with the Chancel Choir) the singing of prayer, and to work with wonderful people like the singers of IPC's Chancel Choir and the instrumentalists from our congregation just to name a couple. And to name a third, to have the chance to show a young person how the pipe organ works! I had the pleasure of giving an impromptu demonstration of our organ to some young people after church a few months ago, and I couldn't help but remember "Miss Marj." Miss Marj was the Director of Music at the church where I was baptized. My dad moved on to a new church when I was four years old, so my memories of my first church are few and distant – I don't have any of Miss Marj

playing the organ (though I remember being at her house a few times). I do remember that at a later point in childhood – maybe when I started organ lessons – my mother told me that Miss Marj was a big part of fostering my love of church music. I remember her summing up my relationship with Miss Marj with: "the two of you got along famously!" Miss Marj, her husband Tim (also an organist), and my parents had a very positive relationship and remained very friendly after we moved in 1990. Sadly, Miss Marj died 10 years ago at the age of 60 after a courageous battle with cancer. Thankfully, I found her on Facebook maybe a year or two before – her notes of encouragement on whatever videos I posted of me playing or conducting were so meaningful, and I treasure them a decade later.

In spite of no memory of her playing the organ or even appreciating the organ at that time, I am certain that Miss Marj and her fostering an open music ministry at my first church – open even to toddler at the time (me) – played a vital role in my faith journey and eventually being called to go into church music. Hearing Rev. Crawford's call at January's annual meeting for IPC to be an open church was music to my ears (pun intended). Throughout the entirety of my ministry, I have worked to foster an open music ministry at each church I have served, including IPC since 2016, with the staunch belief that it takes an open music ministry to have an open church (and vice versa).

Throughout the 2022-23 program year, I will be offering reflections on open music ministry. Perhaps you might have some "who/what/where/when/why/how" percolating, such as: Who participates in an open music ministry? What are the key ingredients for a successful open music ministry? Where does excellence fit in an open music ministry? When is it a challenge to have an open music ministry? Why have an open music ministry? How does an open music ministry please God and make IPC a beacon of light in the community?

And to answer such questions, I will draw on past experiences as I openly (!) examine what goes into an open music ministry.

Meanwhile, I wish you and your families a summer filled with rest, relaxation, joy, and the overwhelming grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ.
