Advent is the time when a new day dawns upon us, when the sun of righteousness comes with healing in his wings, when our world is altered and changed because God is with us, near us, now.

Wherever you find yourself this Advent, we cling to the hope promised by the prophet Isaiah: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined" (9:2).

May the blessings of Christ be with you and your loved ones during this holiday season!

CÉSAR FRANCK Organ Concert

A celebration of César Franck on the 200th anniversary of his birth.

ON SATURDAY, DECEMBER 10, our Director of Music & Organist Jon Riss will present the complete major organ works of César Franck in celebration of the 200th anniversary of the composer's birth. Best known outside of the organ world for his Symphony in D minor and motets (particularly *Panis Angelicus*), Franck equaled his music compositional contributions to the music world with his contributions as a teacher. A Professor at the Paris Conservatoire from 1872 until his death in 1890, his pupils included the composers Ernest Chausson, Vincent d'Indy, Henri Duparc, Guillaume Lekeu, Albert Renaud, Charles Tournemire and Louis Vierne. Many a church organist in France can trace their lineage somehow to 'Père Franck.'

This December 10 concert will start at 6:15 PM and run for approximately two hours and fifteen minutes.



Irvington Presbyterian's MESSIAH

IPC HAS HAD A LONG TRADITION of a strong music program. In the mid-1990s, under the direction of then music director F. Anthony Thurman, IPC offered a program of selected arias, airs, and choruses from Handel's Messiah to the church and the community. With the arrival of Jonathan Riss as music director in November 2016, we presented the *Christmas portion* plus *Hallelujah chorus* and *Worthy is the Lamb*.

In advance of Jon's arrival I decided I was going to sing in the program instead of helping with the reception following it. I had attended many Handel's *Messiah* and naively thought this was ample preparation to sing the oratorio. I joined choir practices with the interim director and during the first chorus we reviewed I was absolutely lost! I went home, went on YouTube and practiced the soprano part with a lovely woman who had recorded the whole thing. I did better in practice, remaining on at least the same page as the rest of the chancel choir. I remember feeling so confident when we finally sat in the chancel to sing. It was hard to keep my focus with Sam Hepler singing bass right behind my seat! Goodness, all these distractions. Nevertheless, I carried on, only getting lost during part of the *Hallelujah chorus* and missing many but not all of the Amens at the end of *Worthy is the Lamb* chorus during the first performance in 2016. In 2017 I did better hitting more hallelujahs and amens than the year before resulting in a celebration afterwards with Chris Omark who joined in the alto section. In 2018, I was confident and invited a coworker. In 2019, I had the joy of having my daughter Sarah singing as well. We missed two years of *Messiah* due to the pandemic but now we are back!

This year's program will be held December 18th at 4PM. As part of our open music ministry, members and friends of IPC who do not regularly sing with the chancel choir will be participating. As well, we have invited our sisters and brothers in Christ from Immaculate Conception Roman Catholic Church, St. Barnabas, Episcopal Church, Aldersgate Methodist Church and South Presbyterian Church to join us. Our hope is to make this an ecumenical Rivertowns choir for our local congregations, neighbors and friends to enjoy.

A suggested donation of \$20 per person and \$40 per family will be collected at the door. A reception will follow arranged by the Deacons, Presbyterian Women, Membership and Fellowship and Worship and Music Committees. Please join us for our post pandemic performance as we "Prepare ye the way of the Lord".

THE JESUS STORYBOOK BIBLE

A Christmas Collection: Stories, Songs, and Reflections for the Advent Season Inspired by Sally Lloyd-Jones, illustrated by Jago, narrated by David Suchet (ages 3-9)


This book is based on Lloyd-Jones wonderful re-tellings of Biblical stories that emphasize God's love for children and connect Jesus with all of scripture; and Jago's beautiful illustrations, which are child-friendly but not silly. Interactive (battery-operated), the Christmas stories are supplemented with narration, and excerpts of four Christmas carols. An excellent way to introduce children to the Biblical themes of Advent and Christmas.



REFUGE*

By Anne Both and Sam Usher (ages 4-8)

This book offers a moving and, for many children, new perspective on the nativity story, relating the struggle of Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus as refugees traveling in a strange land, seeking the protection and kindness of strangers. A good early connection to discussions about God's special care for refugees and foreigners.



A miracle, a journey, and a humble birth, as seen through the eyes of 'outsiders'. Episcopal priest and author, Taylor weaves a thoughtful story around the Biblical passage – providing insights into who these travelers were, why they came, what they found, and why they went home by another way.
